MORE LUNDY SHIPWRECKS

By MICHAEL BOUOUET

Since my article on Lundy Shipwrecks went to press for the 1967 Report. details of the following losses have come to hand.

July 12. Brigantine Jane of Kinsale, Thomas Harper master, Swansea 1792 for Dublin, coal, put ashore on Lundy to save crew; some coal saved.

February, Nancy & Betty, Phillips master, St. Ives for Swansea, foun-1793 dered near Lundy.

January. Brig. Myrtle Tree of Dublin, Baltic for Dublin, "lost on Lundy 1800 Island'

1809 February 8. Baltic, Cardiff for Lundy, foundered near Lundy, crew saved.

November. Concord, Bristol for London, foundered near Lundy crew 1810

July. Brig Eliza of St. Ives, "sunk near Lundy Island", crew rescued from 1841 boat by brig Susan and landed at Appledore.

September 25. Ship Columbine of London, 700 tons, Newport for Jamaica, 1851 sheltering in Roads with 4 ft. of water in hold, slipped her cable, lost anchor and 45 fathom of chain; proceeded to Bristol.

November. French chassemarée Léocadie of Nantes, Lemerle master, Honfleur for Cardiff in ballast, run into by a large brig near Lundy, 1853 crew of four took to boat and landed in "a little cove" near the lighthouse.

1855 August 11. French s.s. Loire, Cardiff for Bordeaux with 750 tons of coal, wrecked at North End. A total loss. Four days later a Mr Forman of Whistable with his team of divers was salving gear from the wreck.

June 10. Schooner Wesleyan, 65 tons, tin and arsenic, dismasted off 1862 Lundy in a force 8 SSW gale, one life lost,

August. Barque Admiral of Jersey, 215 tons, "dashed to pieces on Lundy 1868 Island", only one survivor. November 1. Schooner Julia of Penzance, S. Wales to Penzance with coal,
