heard two days ago, and I was able to be certain that it was a Red-throated Pipit. This area of perhaps 100 yards by 30 yards is thick *juncus* tussocks, boggy, and with a few scattered grassy patches. By careful stalking, twice I obtained good views of the bird on the ground on open grass before it took flight. On two other occasions it took flight before I could relocate it, and on the last occasion it did not pitch down nearby, but flew down onto the slopes above the cliff where I was unable to find it. It always uttered its distinctive call-note once or twice before pitching down.

Notes jotted into my notebook during these ten minutes read:-

Call-"tseeze", thin, drawn-out.

General plumage—a dark, heavily streaked pipit lacking the yellow tinge of Meadow Pipit, generally grey.

Blackish moustachial streak becoming wide at lower end, and darkish grey

ear-coverts.

Legs and feet pale flesh pink.

Throat and breast heavily streaked with dark or black, the streaks continuing right down the flanks.

Buff tips to median and greater coverts giving double wing-bar.

White outer tail feathers.

Supercilium indistinct, buff, almost not there.

At no time did I obtain a clear view of its rump. Size and shape was just like Meadow Pipit, but the tail seemed a trifle shorter in flight.

This record has been accepted by the Rarities Committee and is the third occurrence on Lundy.

BUTTERFLIES AND MOTHS

Lepidoptera is one branch of natural history that has not been intensively studied on Lundy. During 1972 and 1973 a daily record of butterflies was maintained. Early in 1973 a portable, battery-operated ultra-violet tube light was purchased, and this was operated to attract moths on a dozen or so evenings.

In 1968 C. Garrett-Jones operated a light-trap for three nights in early July, publishing his findings in the annual report for that year. There are a few records of moths published in some of the early Field Society reports, particu-

larly 1951.

In the following list, the butterflies are those recorded during 1973 only, with first and last dates and some indication of abundance; and the moths are an amalgamated list of all available data, with reference being made to the year or

years of recording.

1973 was an exceptionally good year for butterflies with the long, dry summer producing bumper broods. Two migrant species, Red Admiral (*Vanessa atalanta*) and Painted Lady (*Vanessa cardui*) were both very pominent, but there were no records of Common Clouded Yellow (*Colias croceus*) which has occurred

in past years, particularly 1948 when it was very numerous.

Migrant moths were also well represented. A single Hummingbird Hawk (Macroglossum stellatarum) was seen in the Hotel garden on 19th September. A single Convolvulus Hawk (Herse convolvuli) was trapped in the Terrace trap on 30th August and was later released in Millcombe—it was in very worn condition and had probably only just arrived after migrating from North Africa. Silver Y (Plusia gamma) was exceedingly numerous during August and September, the heather moorland often seething with them.

BATS

Two bats were seen during 1973, as follows:-One small, unidentified bat was flying in Millcombe at dusk on 30th May. Noctule Bat (Nyctalus noctula). One flying between Battlements and Landing Beach for at least an hour during afternoon of 25th October.

CETACEA and SHARKS

Daily records were maintained of all reported sightings of cetacea and sharks. There are considerable identification difficulties with these groups and so unidentified records are listed with the specific ones.

CETACEA

Dolphin sp. A school of c50 off North End on 1st June were probably Common Dolphins (Delphinus delphis).

Risso's Dolphin (Grampus griseus). Two close inshore off Puffin Gully on 25th June.

Common Porpoise (Phocaena phocaena). One off North End on 25th June, one off North End on 15th July, and one found washed up freshly dead at Gannet's Rock on 29th October.

SHARKS

Basking Sharks (Cetorhinus maximus). Recorded daily from 11th to 18th July, mostly 1-2 but five on 16th, then three on 24th July, one on 11th August and one on 28th September. Usually basking off East Side, but sometimes around South End, once off Battery Point and once in Jenny's Cove.

Shark sp. Small sharks (4-6 feet), most probably Blue Sharks (Carcharias glaucus), seen as follows:-one in Landing Bay on 1st July, two off North End on 13th July and two there again on 16th July.
